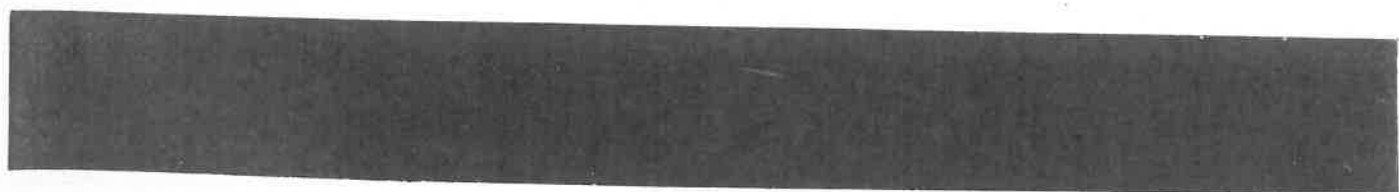
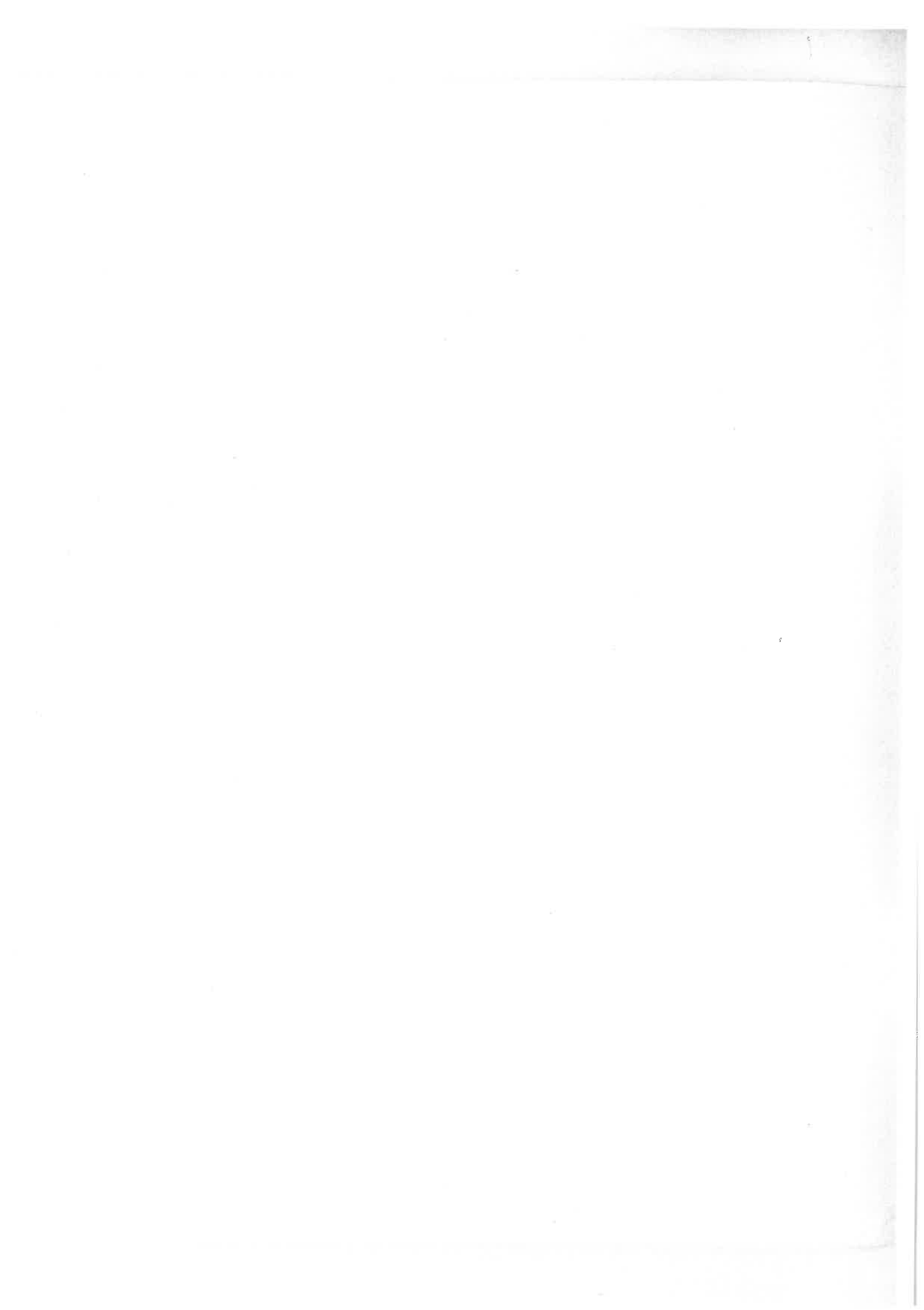

OUR NEW RECTOR

Father Frank Bertagnolli arrived in Hobart in March to become Rector at Dominic College, after representing Australia at the international Salesian Conference in Rome earlier this year.

He has had a long association with Salesian education since his own early schooling in Italy under the Salesians. His secondary education and teacher training were completed in Victoria where he taught at Salesian College, Sunbury from 1959 to 1962.

Ecclesiastical studies were then undertaken at Oakleigh (Vic.), Naples and Rome and after ordination, Fr. Bertagnolli completed his Master's degree at Fordham University, New York in 1968.

Back in Australia, he taught at St. Joseph's College, Ferntree Gully and lectured at Auxilium Teacher Training College (Lysterfield), and Catholic College (Clayton). He was later appointed Rector at Don Bosco Boys Club and Hostel (Brunswick, Vic.) before taking up his present position.

Whatever lies ahead, by being the best person you are capable of being, you can do untold good for many people. You will bring joy and happiness by your actions, your kind words, your interest in others. You will generously share your gifts of nature and of grace.

For your friendliness during the three years I have spent at Dominic I thank you and wish you well in the coming year, whether it is back at school, in other "halls of learning" or in the workforce. My prayer for you is that you will walk with God all the days of your lives and know the joy of being aware of His constant love for you.

The Year in Retrospect

The school year began in February on a sad note with the news of the tragic death in Paraguay of Fr. Paplin, a former teacher at Dominic. The College was soon to be further saddened with the passing of Mrs. Doran a much-loved friend of the school. Their work for the College will not be forgotten.

Apart from our new Rector, there were a number of new faces among the staff. Mrs. Toni McIntyre and Mr. Pat Naughtin joined the staff of the Senior School; Mr. Ray Blucher, Mrs. Jackie Conboy, Sr. Marie O'Regan, Sr. Marcia and Mrs. Ham joined the Middle School; and Mrs. Kay Pullen and Mrs. Foley joined the Primary School. Father Varengo was also welcomed back after his serious back injury. Later in the year, we were sorry to lose Mrs. Pearcey who left because of ill-health after her long association with the College but, at the same time, we were happy to welcome Mrs. Berkery.

St. Dominic's Day (8th May), the feastday of the Salesian patron was celebrated in the presence of the Salesian Provincial, Fr. W. Cornell. After Mass a variety of activities followed including a concert, barbeque, games and fancy dress.

The feast of St. Dominic Guzman was celebrated on August 8th with a special Mass and concert, the main feature being a play based on the life of the founder of the Dominicans.

Also in August, Fr. George Williams S.D.B., from Salesian Headquarters in Rome visited the College and celebrated Mass with us on the Feast of the Assumption.

The Annual Senior School Supper Dance was held on August 25th at the Hilltop Restaurant and, being well-attended by both students and parents, a very good night resulted.

The Annual Fair was held on Friday evening, October 6th, being once again a huge success.

A group of Grade 7 students represented the College at the 48th Eucharistic Congress in Melbourne on Sunday, 5th November.

Fun(d) Raising

This year has been a most successful one for fund raising activities of many kinds. The Parents and Friends Association has organised a number of bottle drives, raffles and streetstalls in addition to the two outstanding efforts, the Primary School "Walk-a-thon" in April and the fair in October, which was even more successful than last year's grand effort, thanks to the support of so many parents and organisation of Mrs. Derrick.

Those "not so fortunate" have not been forgotten by Dominic students this year and in various ways money has been raised. Many senior students participated in the "40 Hour Famine" earlier this year and the recent "Freedom from Hunger" doorknock, raising very pleasing amounts. The Community Aid Abroad appeal was also well supported by Middle School students.

Currently, the Indonesian students at Dominic are sponsoring a student in Indonesia, while a group of Grade 5 students have raised money for a child in the Philippines to have plastic surgery after serious burns.

CAREERS

Career education for 1978 began with quite an amount of interest and enthusiasm shown by the Senior School staff members. A team from the Psychology Section of the Commonwealth Department of Employment and Industrial Relations headed by the Chief Psychologist, Venetta Bumbieris, visited the Senior School and conducted an in-service training day for staff members in the use of the Career Planning Pack. This was followed up by a very well attended meeting at which support for the scheme was expressed by the great majority of the ninety or so parents who attended.

The program started in Term I and ideally should have been continued with little interruption until its completion. Two main problems detracted from what could have been a very worthwhile project for Grade 10 students, all of whom were involved. Firstly, interruptions due to visiting speakers, holidays and sporting commitments broke the continuity and both teachers, acting as discussion leaders, and the students involved felt the loss of momentum and the resulting fall in interest.

Secondly, the course ideally should be completed with active student involvement. Most students displayed interest in the course and many put some effort and work into it. All groups had the opportunity to visit the Career Reference Centre which was seen as most worthwhile by students and staff alike but unfortunately the opportunity for work experience was not available to our students.

Our application for inclusion in the scheme, which is available to Education Department schools in Tasmania, has successfully passed all stages expect gaining Ministerial approval. This has been recommended by the Director General and is anticipated after a meeting on October 5th.

Not all students gained significant benefit this year but a greater percentage were given the opportunity of first hand career advice and much more was achieved as a result when compared with previous years.

Hopefully with the experience we have gained from conducting the scheme this year we will, with the introduction of work experience and the eradication of our recognised shortcomings go onto bigger and better things next year.

It is important for students who leave and are unsuccessful in gaining or continuing in employment to realize that the College is notified of employment vacancies which arise from time to time during the year. These people should make contact with me as well as other employment agencies so they can be considered when any likely opportunities arise.

I wish all leavers happiness and success for the future and assure them of our continuing interest.

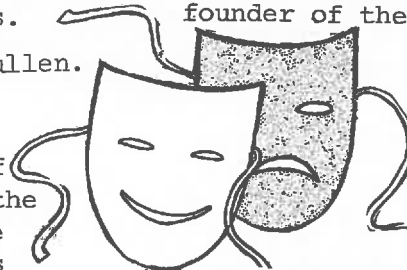

SOUTH AUSTRALIAN TOUR

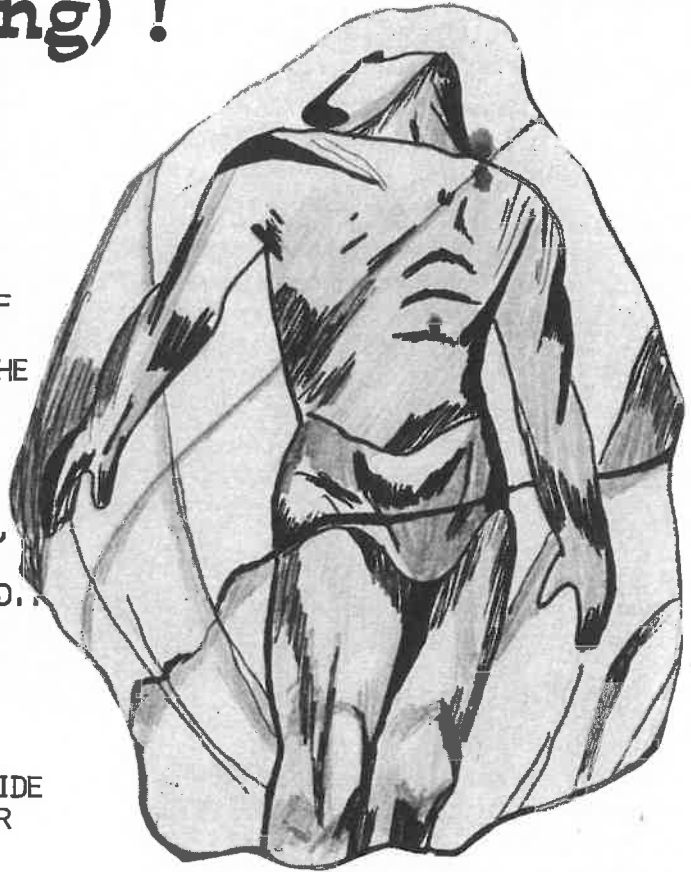

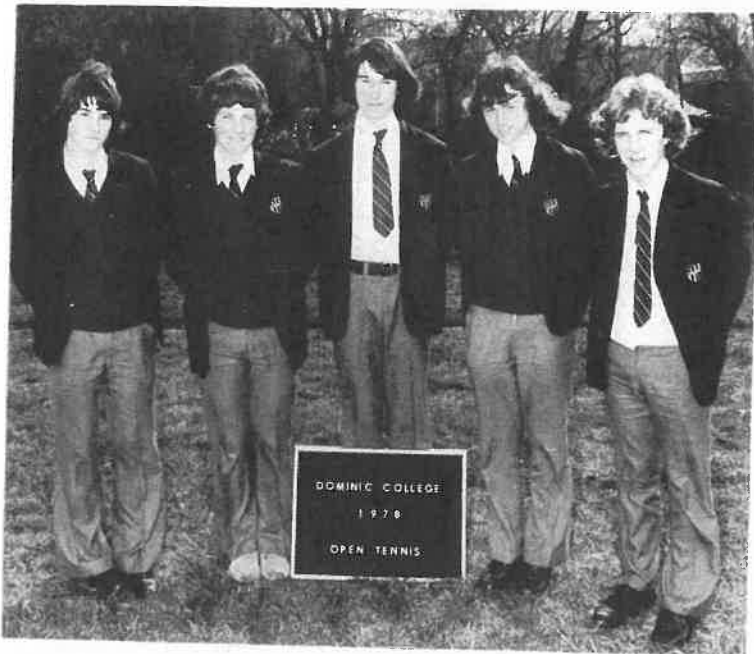
The Open Team must be congratulated on its success this year and particular mention must be made of the efforts of coaches, Tony Matthyz and Doug Walton.

TABLE TENNIS

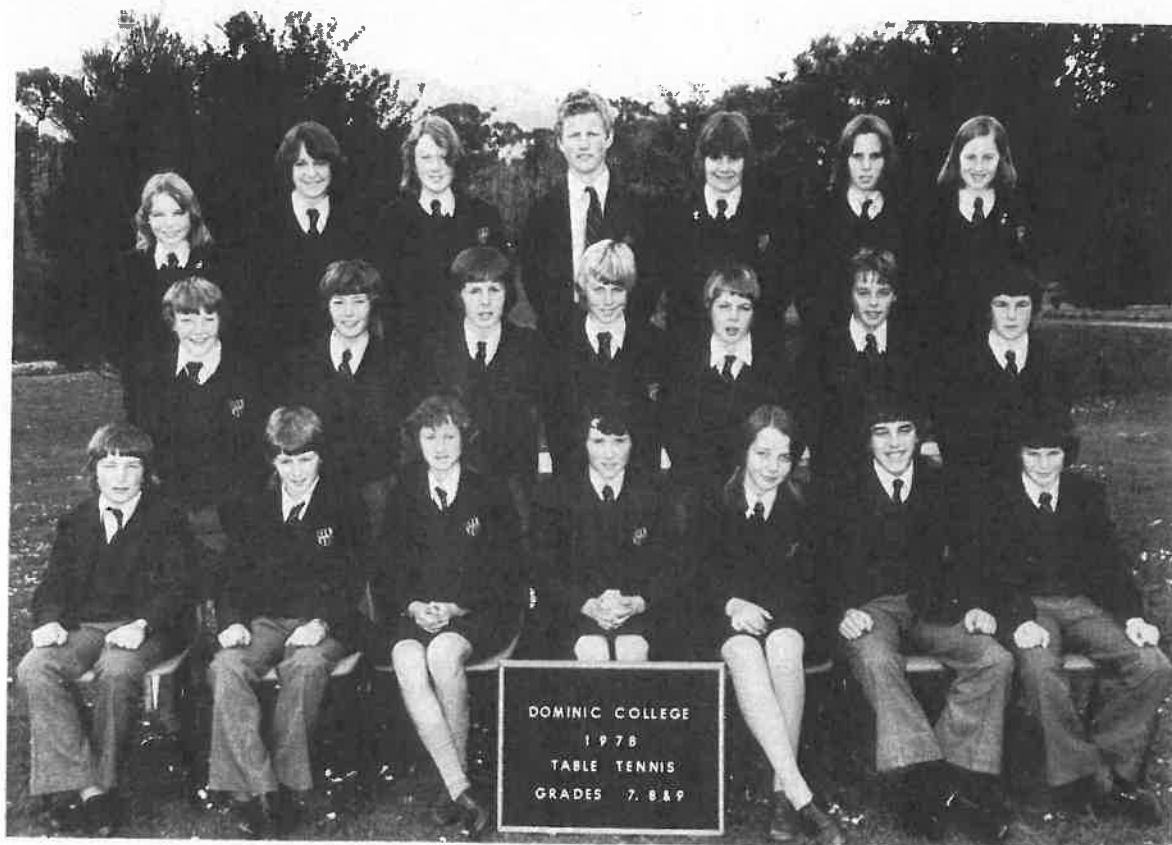


Table Tennis is well established as a strong sport at Dominic. This year, in the winter roster there were no less than thirteen teams, most of them beginners.

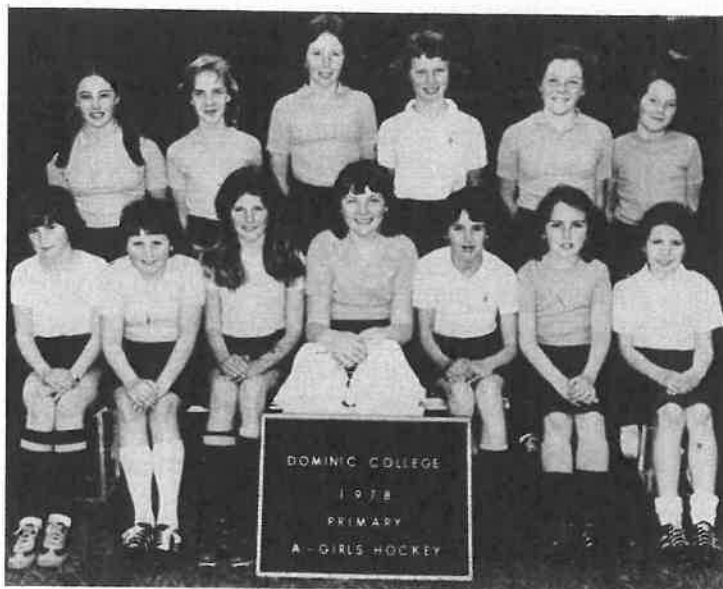

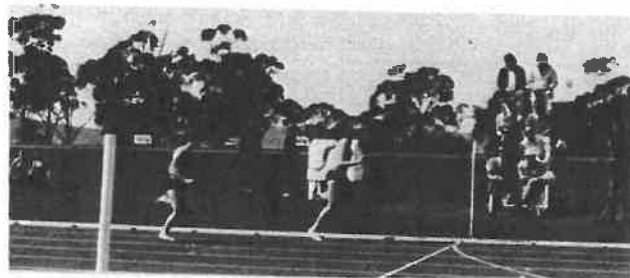

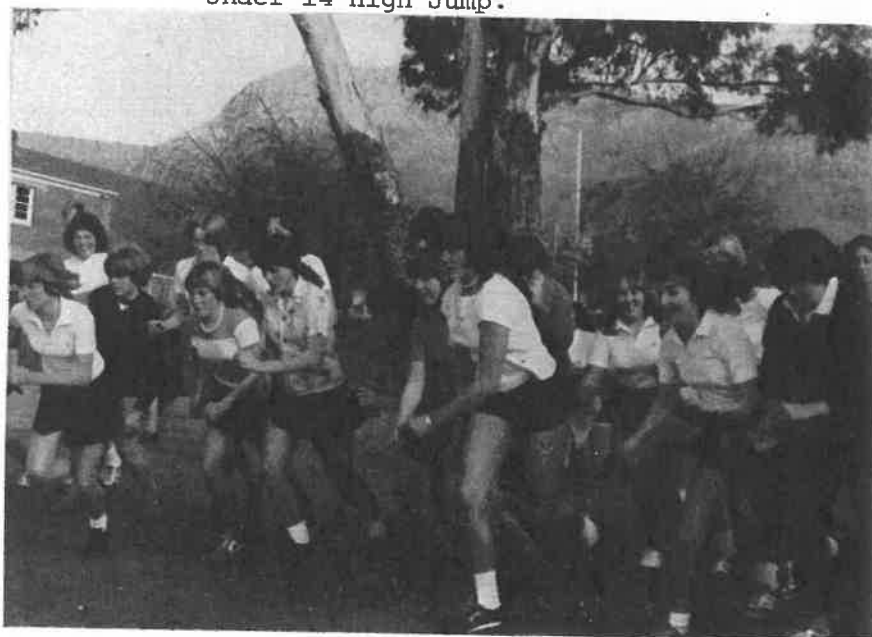

BUSHWALKING

Dominic College Old

The aims of the Dominic College Old Scholars Association (DOSA) are:-

1. to preserve, deepen and put into practice the principles among Old Scholars of Dominic College;
2. to publish a newspaper for Old Scholars of Dominic College;
3. to raise funds for carrying out the aims of the Association.

All persons who have attended Dominic College (including past pupils of Holy Name and Savio College) are eligible to become members of the Association. The Association also provides for associate membership. This means that people who have had contact with the college or are friends of Old Scholars are eligible to associate membership at the discretion of the committee.

The affairs of the Association are managed by a committee consisting of sixteen members elected annually at the Annual General meeting. At this present time our committee consists of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Maintenance Officers, Editors, Social Organisers, Sports Co-ordinator, Membership Officer and Apostolate and Liturgy officers.

All these positions and their functions help the association to run smoothly. The biggest job for the committee is usually the printing and publishing of the old scholars newspaper (Dosa News). We print nine editions a year and these are issued to about six hundred members.

There are eleven Old Scholars sports teams: three table tennis teams, two netball teams, two football teams, two mens' basketball teams, one womens' basketball team and one cricket team. Sports teams are formed once it is indicated by a sufficient number of members that they would like to form a particular team.
