Since our last edition, much has happened at St Patrick's College.

Each year is marked by the farewell of a graduating class, our newest group of alumni—and the welcome of a new group of Year 7 students, beginning their own St Patrick's journey. Exciting times lie ahead for both groups.

For our graduates, a new chapter begins, whether that's university, apprenticeships, a gap year, work and study, or travel. We are confident that their time at St Patrick's College has equipped them well for the world they are stepping into. We know they will go on to make meaningful contributions across many fields and communities.

For our incoming Year 7 students, the next six years promise a rich opportunity of learning, sport, culture, faith, and friendship. It's a journey that will challenge and shape them, just as it has done for the many that have come before.

Throughout 2024 and into 2025, the College has continued to thrive. Highlights from the year include exceptional student performances in the arts; our College musical *Midnight: The Cinderella Story* showcased the musical and theatrical talents of both students and staff, alongside strong academic achievements and a number of sporting premierships across multiple year levels.

Our College Outreach programs remain a cornerstone of student life, with many students actively involved in community partnerships, fundraising, and service initiatives. These experiences reflect the values at the heart of a St Patrick's education: compassion, leadership and social justice. Students in Years 10, 11, and 12 participate in our *Ascent* program, where they develop servant leadership skills through supporting others in our community. Throughout the year, our Year 9 students prepare soup and slices weekly to support the Vinnies Food Vans, a significant act of care.

A significant milestone this year has been the opening of the *Penola Innovation Centre*, our new learning facility named in honour of the town where Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods began their pioneering work in education.

The *Penola Innovation Centre*, incorporating the *Ballygriffin Cafe*, has quickly become a vibrant hub of student learning, engagement and innovation. It symbolises both our rich Josephite and Presentation heritage and our ongoing commitment to contemporary education. The centre comprises six science labs, two general classrooms, a makerspace, a computer laboratory, a digital technology lab, and two magnificent STEM classrooms. More than just a building, it has become a space for learning, wellbeing, and connection.

We gratefully acknowledge the work of CMK Architects, Curtis McKirdy and Liam Javis; Beardwood Construction, Luke Beardwood, Ash Beardwood, Mitchell Gilam, and Dave Zeeman; and our College staff, particularly Business Manager Karen Cole and Facilities Manager Kris Eade, for their leadership and commitment to this landmark project.

We encourage all our Old Collegians to stay in touch, whether through reunions, mentoring opportunities, or simply by sharing your stories with us. Your connection to the College reminds our current students that they are part of something lasting and significant.

To support this, we've recently launched *Alumni*, a new platform that allows Old Collegians to reconnect with one another. If your email is registered with the College, you will have received an invitation to join. We encourage you to sign up and invite others within your network to do the same, helping us to grow a vibrant and connected alumni community.

We were recently honoured to welcome back the Honourable Justice Penny Neskovic, who was College Captain in 1987. In February 2024, Justice Neskovic was formally sworn in as a Judge of the Federal Court of Australia. It was inspiring for our students to hear from a College graduate who has made such a distinguished contribution to the legal profession and to public life.

Thank you for your continued support of St Patrick's College. We look forward to all that the coming year will bring and to continuing the proud tradition of the Patrician community.



Celebrating 40 Years of Co-education at St Patrick's College

On Saturday, 26 October, we celebrated 40 years of co-education at St Patrick's College with our Anniversary Open Day.

The day began with a special Mass led by Archbishop Julian Porteous, where we honoured the legacy of the 1994 amalgamation between Marian College and St Patrick's College. As a community we took the opportunity to express our gratitude to the Presentation Sisters, who brought Catholic Education to Launceston in 1873 by establishing Sacred Heart College; to the Christian Brothers, who established St Patrick's College at York Street in 1919, opening the Prospect campus in 1958; and to the Sisters of St Joseph, who established St Thomas More's in 1938.

Following the Mass, our 2024 College Captains joined Sr Carmel Jones of the Sisters of

St Joseph, Sr Elizabeth Vagg of the Presentation Sisters, Br Clem Barrett of the Christian Brothers, and Archbishop Porteous for a celebratory cutting of the cake. This moment was particularly special because of Sr Carmel and Sr Elizabeth's presence, along with Br Clem, who served as the first principal of the newly co-educational College in 1984.

Nostalgia was in the air as Old Collegians (including Reunion groups comprising graduates from 1974, 1984 and 1994), staff, students, and community members toured the College, admiring the many changes and reminiscing over treasured memories. The tours were aided by digital presentations and visits to the History Room, which provided glimpses of familiar faces from the past.

The celebration culminated with a relaxed BBQ at Croagh Patrick,

where guests gathered in the sunshine to reconnect and share stories.

This event was a beautiful reminder of our strong community - a day for students, staff, Old Collegians and our extended community to come together and celebrate all that St Patrick's College is in 2024.

May we continue to build on the legacy that is St Patrick's College for the generations to come.

Strong Foundations

Transforming Our College Spaces

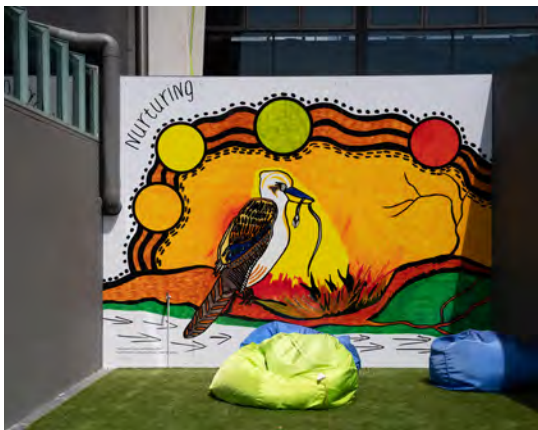
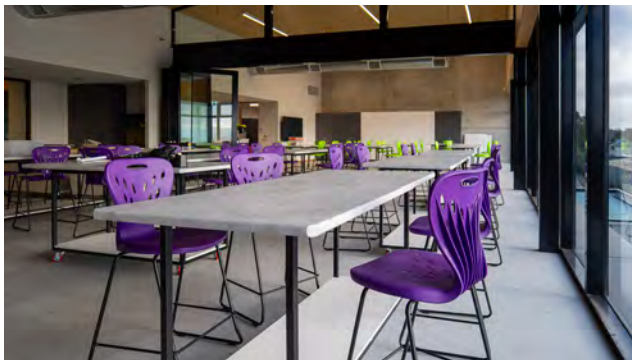
The highly anticipated STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) project began in 2023, following the signing of a contract with Beardwood PTY Ltd in late 2022. Demolition of the old science classrooms and surrounding buildings was carried out to make way for this transformative development at the centre of our campus.

The new facility unites our gymnasiums, Middle School, Senior School and Library into a single connected building. It features modern classrooms, science laboratories, STEM learning spaces, breakout areas for study and socialising, and a central cafeteria and amphitheatre.

To offset the loss of five classrooms during demolition, Anstie Constructions installed two temporary classrooms—an absolute minimum, resulting in a 98% room occupancy rate and a very tight timetable.

Construction experienced early delays in 2023 due to issues with the delivery and installation of a new electrical substation. Despite these setbacks, the Ballygriffin Cafe began operating earlier this year, offering staff and students an assortment of high quality hot and cold lunch options.





While work was underway on the Penola Innovation Centre, the College also took the opportunity to reconfigure the top Middle School courtyard, now known as The Founders Ground. Beardwood completed the earthworks and civil works, while the College sourced and installed ninja-style equipment to create a level space with an exercise circuit designed to challenge balance, strength, and agility.

The new equipment is already proving popular, used in Physical and Outdoor Education classes as well as by students during recess and lunch.





Penola Innovation Centre

Opening of the Penola Innovation Centre & Ballygriffin Cafe

On September 26, the Penola Innovation Centre and Ballygriffin Cafe were officially opened by Archbishop Anthony Ireland. Archbishop Tony celebrated a Liturgy with our community, speaking about the strength and inspiration of Nano Nagle and Saint Mary MacKillop. He also reminded us of the importance of gratitude, encouraging us to express thanks to those who impact, help, and support us, as this is essential to building strong human relationships and connections. We look forward to welcoming Archbishop Tony back to our College in the future, where he will have further opportunities to connect with our College community.

The name Penola holds deep significance in the story of Australia's first saint, Mary MacKillop, and her mentor, Fr Julian Tenison Woods. In 1866, in the small town of Penola in South Australia, Mary MacKillop and Julian Tenison Woods founded the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart. Together they shared a vision of providing education to children, especially those in rural and disadvantaged communities. Penola was the place where this vision came to life: Mary opened her first school there in a disused stable, marking the beginning of a movement that would spread across Australia and beyond. By choosing the name Penola, we honour this spirit of courage, vision, and dedication to the needs of others. Just as Penola was the birthplace of innovation in education through Mary and Julian's bold steps, our Penola Innovation Centre will be a place where creativity, collaboration, and new ideas flourish. It will remind us that true innovation is not only about technology or modern spaces, but about using our gifts to serve others and make a difference.

Our new cafeteria has been named the Ballygriffin Cafe in honour of the birthplace of Nano Nagle, the foundress of the Presentation Sisters.

Nano Nagle was born in Ballygriffin, County Cork, Ireland in 1718. Growing up in a time when Catholics in Ireland were denied the right to education, Nano experienced first-hand the struggles of poverty and injustice. Deeply moved by the needs of the poor, she went on to found schools in Cork, bringing education and hope to children who would otherwise have had none. Her work grew into the foundation of the Presentation Sisters, whose mission of faith, education, and service has spread across the world — including here in our own College community.

The Fiddler On The Roof

The 1995 musical "Fiddler on the Roof" filled the Guilford Theatre for each of its eight performances from 27th April to 6th May. The cast of fifty actors, forty musicians and thirty production crew was drawn from all grades of the Prospect Campus. Rehearsals started soon after school resumed in February and although there were times when we thought we would never get there it finally all came together and produced a worthy successor to "Barnum", "Wizard of Oz" and "The Mikado".

"Fiddler" tells the story of a Russian Jewish family in the village of Anatevka. Tevye (Paul Lee-Archer) and his wife Golde (Janelle Saarinen) have to cope with changes from the world outside their village when their eldest daughters, Tzeitel (Kendra Harris), Hodel (Brooke Laidler) and Chava (played by Emma Walters and Kate Oliver) choose their own husbands thus turning their backs on tradition. On a wider level Tevye and his family and the Jewish community are swept up in the pogrom of 1905 which results in the families of Anatevka migrating to the USA, Palestine and Poland.

The simple, yet very effective sets, were constructed by Mr Huxtable with assistance from Mr Gardner, Mr O'Connor and Mr McKenna. For the wardrobe department we borrowed some of the more elaborate costumes but Mrs Nielsen led a very willing band of ladies and the Year 9 textiles class to provide the majority of the simpler clothes. Mrs Christine Gilmour kindly advised us on the dance routines which were a highlight of the show.

The orchestra was placed outside the theatre in the foyer and although this gave us more room for the stage and seating it did give us a few anxious moments when Orchestra and actors had no contact at all! However our Musical Director, Ms Cochrane, carried us through with no-one in the audience aware of the drama outside. Many thanks to our guest-artists, Mrs Hoare, Miss Delamore, Mr Howison and Mr Kershua.

Many thanks to all students, staff, parents and friends who gave their time and effort to ensure the success of this wonderful production.

We are saddened to share the passing of Adrian Kok, a much-loved member of the St Patrick's College community, who passed away on 2 May, surrounded by his wife, Leah, and daughter, Alison, after a long journey with bowel cancer.

Adrian was a proud Old Collegian, attending St Patrick's College through the 1960s. His commitment to the College extended far beyond his school years. From the mid-1980s until 2009, Adrian dedicated himself to coaching and refereeing soccer at the College, generously sharing his time and passion for the sport.

Adrian also played a vital role on the Parents & Friends Committee, instrumental in fundraising efforts for numerous projects, including the College's swimming pool. His role as a Produce Manager at Roelf Vos, later Woolworths, allowed him to support College and community initiatives in practical and meaningful ways—most notably through his contributions to Edmund Rice Camps and his encouragement for the College to start its own Relay for Life team in support of the Cancer Council.

Adrian's legacy at St Patrick's is one of quiet service, generosity and deep community spirit.

We extend our deepest sympathies to Leah, Alison, and all of Adrian's loved ones. He will be dearly missed and fondly remembered as a true pillar of the St Patrick's College community.

May he rest in peace.

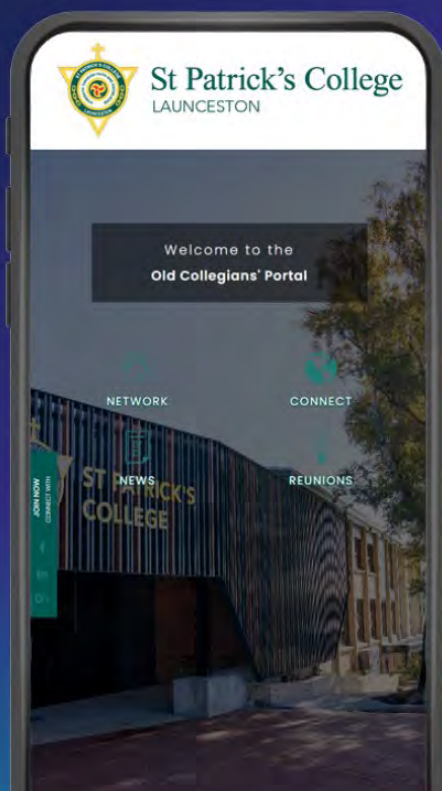
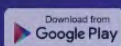
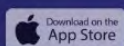
